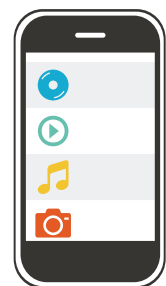

ABOUT SRJC

Santa Rosa Junior College was established in 1918 and is the 11th oldest of the 116 California Community Colleges.



STATS

- Founded in 1918, SRJC has served Sonoma County for over 105 years.
- **Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI)** designation in 2014. We have received 4 federal HSI grants since 2014.
- SRJC continues to be noted as #1 or #2 among the 116 California community colleges for scholarships awarded to students.
- SRJC enrolls approximately 31,000 students annually (3-year average).
- Most common degrees awarded: Social & Behavioral Sciences, Natural Sciences, Psychology, Business Administration, Nursing ADN, Humanities, Pre-Allied Health, Sociology
- Most common certificates earned: Basic Police Academy, Firefighter Academy, Fire Resilient Landscaping, Tax Preparation, Veterinary Technician, Computer Operations for the Workplace, Paramedic, Bookkeeper

STUDENT TRANSFER

- On average, 1,400 SRJC students transfer to a four-year university each year, with over 800 continuing to a CSU.
- Nearly 80% of SRJC applicants to the University of California are accepted.
- The top transfer destinations for SRJC students are Sonoma State University, UC Davis and UC Berkeley. Students from SRJC also transfer to many high-profile universities, including Stanford, UCLA, and USC

STUDENT LIFE

- Student Life is the hub of campus engagement at SRJC, where leadership, connection, and community come together. From the Student Government Assembly (SGA) to the 60+ active clubs reflecting diverse student interests - it offers valuable leadership opportunities to grow and make an impact. Whether you're planning events, representing peers, or meeting others who share your passions, Student Life is your gateway to thriving - both personally and professionally.

 - 100-acre campus, Santa Rosa
 - 40-acre campus, Petaluma Campus
 - SRJC Public Safety Training Center, Windsor
 - SRJC Shone Farm, near Forestville
 - SRJC Roseland, southwest Santa Rosa

STUDENT SUCCESS

- In Sonoma County, nearly 40% of high school graduates who attend college the fall after graduation enroll at SRJC.
- SRJC offers around 1,700 different courses each semester, with more than 110 majors and 180 certificates.
- Students that attend a Career Education course at SRJC earn roughly 40% more than before studies or training.
- SRJC awards approximately 2,200 associate degrees and 3,900 certificates per year.

FINANCIAL AID/SCHOLARSHIPS/FEES

SCHOLARSHIPS

- More than \$6 million in scholarships were awarded to provide life-changing opportunities for deserving SRJC students.
- The SRJC Foundation scholarships provided \$2 million, and the prestigious Frank P. and Polly O'Meara Doyle Scholarship fund provided \$4 million.

FINANCIAL AID

- During the 2023-2024 academic year, over 9,000 students received federal or state financial aid to assist with the costs of attending SRJC. Over \$30 million in grants, work-study, student loans, and California Community Colleges Board of Governors (BOG) Fee Waivers were awarded.

FEES

- California resident students who do not qualify for financial aid or scholarships pay \$46 per unit plus fees. Non-resident students pay \$408 per unit, plus fees. (This does not include books, parking, health fees, and other fees that still apply.)

SRJC FOUNDATION

- The SRJC Foundation is among the leading community college foundations nationwide with an endowment of more than \$70 million to support students and programs for generations to come.
